- Reviewing ways to enhance communication through existing or new media.

I recently realized that the small town where I grew up in eastern North Carolina has one half of the population of East Lake Woodlands! Imagine my surprise when I discovered that Beaufort, NC has 68 full time employees in addition to a full service county government. To put it in perspective, East Lake Woodlands has zero employees. Yes, we contract services, but the leadership needed to execute our community's needs is a purely voluntary group, your board of directors. We cannot do it without input, comments and help from those we gladly serve. To borrow from and paraphrase Abraham Lincoln, we are a community of the people, by the people, and for the people. The more who engage, the better we all become.

A standard organizational meeting took place as per board policy after the ELWCA annual meeting on March 29. The Board discussed rotating positions within the group in order to get new perspectives and eventually voted Susan Whitehead as president. Judy Fosbrook resigned her position after a highly successful term of 10 years. The entire board wishes her well as she returns to a peaceful, private life. At the April 11 meeting the board reviewed three volunteer candidates for the open board position. The board voted to appoint Paul Burmeister to fill the director slot.

OUTSIDE THE GATES by Richard Corrigan, Director ELWCA

Last month we outlined several of the projects that received funding from the BP settlement funds received by Pinellas County. While those projects have not necessarily begun yet, the County Commissioners are already turning to what projects might be funded if the Penny for Pinellas sales tax is extended for one year at the referendum to be

held this November. The commissioners prefer that these funds be used for infrastructure development or improvement and are soliciting ideas from the community. By the time you read this, the Penny for Pinellas survey will have been completed. However, if you did not complete this survey, you can write in your ideas to the commissioners at large who serve North County or in support of the ideas that are already being considered or have been advanced by interested parties. The Council of North County Neighborhoods (CNCN) held a forum on April 17 at East Lake Woodlands Country Club to hear ideas from citizens or justification for projects already under consideration.

High on that list is a new mulcher for Brooker Creek Preserve. While the preserve currently leases a mulcher, having its own equipment will help it regularly gather and shred the ground litter and undergrowth that accumulates in the preserve during the dry season and grows abundantly when the rains return. It is in all East Lake corridor residents interests that the flammable growth and litter be reduced given the risk of fires. As we have seen during this exceptionally dry winter, the risk of brush fires is high as evidenced by the recent massive burn in Osceola County.

The Friends of the Library will also be out in force to support their planned Phase II expansion of the East Lake Library. If you have not been up to the facility to see their plans it is worth a trip - check out a good read while you are there - the conceptual plan is quite impressive and would mean 2,500 square feet of extra facilities for the community. East Lake Library serves not only the East Lake corridor but also pulls in clients form southern Pasco County making it one of the most heavily traveled facilities in the library system so expansion is needed as well as the move to make the library a community center. Lois Fennel and her staff will be at the April 17th meeting to discuss this request as well as other fund raising activities.

The Palm Harbor Library is also considering a new roof. Although this would ordinarily be a maintenance or facilities reserve expense in the county budget, as the revenue stream is still recovering from the Great Recession, PHCSA, which manages the facility is turning to Penny for Pinellas for funding of this critical repair. The Palm Harbor Library has been cutting back hours to save funds for maintenance which does no one any good.

Ozona is looking to save its coastline and this may be a harbinger of things to come for all of Pinellas as the cause of concern is rising sea levels. Not only will this threaten the beach areas but also the mangrove stands that provide filtration, preserve the coastline and harbor fish fry (baby fish) from predators.

Since Penny for Pinellas funding won't be decided until after the November referendum it will be after Hurricane season. But that is no reason not to look at your flood policies for both your own dwelling plus your HOA. A major and necessary expense post any large storm is cleanup of debris and fallen trees etc. Make sure your HOA has adequate coverage for this potential expense. You should also note that FEMA flood insurance may cover tree damage to your own property if caused by a storm with associated flooding.

The good news is that the hurricane season, which begins in June, is forecast to be light with only 11 named storms, 4 hurricanes and only two predicted to hit the east coast somewhere between Florida and Maine. Now I am trying to figure out why that prediction comes from a university situated in the Rocky Mountains north of Denver!

EARTHDAY WITHOUT LEAVING YOUR PROPERTY—THE HIDDEN COSTS OF IRRIGATION OVERSPRAY AND RUN-OFF

ELIMINATING RUN-OFF AND OVERSPRAY

Run-off

Run-off occurs when water is applied too fast, or in too great an amount, to the soil. In addition to over-watering (applying too much water overall), run-off can occur on sloped landscapes when landscapes are watered too long for their soil type.

Overspray

Overspray is simply the water that lands beyond the planted or target area. When the overspray lands on sidewalks, drives and other hard surfaces it can, and does, empty into the streets and local waterways. Garden beds and irrigation systems should be designed to avoid overspray onto impervious surfaces. Lawns should be held back from streets and driveways. Overhead irrigation should not be used in planting areas directly adjacent to streets, driveways and waterways. Irregular-shapes and narrow strips of lawn should be avoided, as it is difficult to water them without the occurrence of over spray.

The hidden costs of overspray and run-off:

- Paying for water that is not needed, or used, in the garden.
- Accelerated deterioration of asphalt drives and parking areas.
- Damage to fences, siding, patios, walks and other garden structures.
- Reducing water quality at creeks and beaches.
- Harming aquatic life.
- Causing disease in humans that come into contact with polluted waters.
- Creek clean up and watershed restoration projects.

BIRD OF THE MONTH BROWN PELICAN

His beak can hold more than his belly-can. He can hold in his beak, Enough fish for a week, But I'm darned if I know how the hell-hecan,"

Squadrons of Brown Pelicans can routinely be seen flying together in V-formation above the surf line along both the southern and western coasts of the U.S. While there are seven species of pelicans, the Brown Pelican is the smallest and also the only one that plunges from the air into the water to catch its food. They feed by plunge-diving from high up, using the force of impact to stun small fish before scooping them up.

While the Brown Pelican is draining the water from its bill after a dive, gulls often try to steal the fish right out of its pouch. They sometimes even perch on the pelican's head or back and reach in. The pelican itself, however, is not above stealing fish from other seabirds. It also follows fishing boats and hangs around piers for handouts.

Brown Pelicans mostly eat small fish that form schools near the surface of the water – in Florida, mullet is a favorite fish. A pelican will spot a fish from the air and will then dive head-first from as high as 65-feet over the ocean, tucking and twisting to the left to protect its trachea and esophagus from the impact. As the pelican plunges into the water, its throat pouch expands to trap the fish, filling with up to 2.6 gallons of water. Pelicans usually feed within 12-miles of the shoreline but will occasionally venture further offshore. Sometimes they will feed by sitting on the surface and seizing prey with their bills when a dense school of fish is close to the surface and the water is too shallow to plunge-dive.

The Brown Pelican frequently lowers its head onto its shoulders with the bill open, pulls its head back, and stretches the pouch over its

throat and neck. The exposed neck looks like a large lump sticking up out of the pouch.

Pelicans live and nest in what are called colonies or rookeries. On the Atlantic and Gulf coasts they breed mostly on barrier islands, natural islands in estuaries, and islands made of refuse from dredging. But in Florida they primarily use mangrove islands. The male picks out a nesting site either on the ground or in a tree. One of

these locations is used to lure a female and if she likes the site of the nest she may give the male a chance. The female ultimately does the mate selecting and she must make the final selection on the nest site as well. It is important that the male is not too aggressive or he will chase away the female, but he needs to be aggressive enough to avoid other males from moving in on his site. He performs a display of head movements and a female will approach usually within two to four days due to either his display, site/nest construction or plumage, or a combination of some of these. Once she accepts her partner they will then attempt to mate right away.

Unlike most birds, which warm their eggs with the skin of their breasts, pelicans incubate their eggs with the skin of their feet, basically standing on the eggs to keep them warm. They hold the eggs under the webs that stretch from the front toes to the hind toe. This peculiar incubation

method made them vulnerable to the effects of the pesticide DDT. The DDT made the eggshells thin, and the weight of the incubating parents frequently cracked their eggs. After nearly disappearing from North America in the 1960's and 70's, they have now made a full comeback thanks to pesticide regulations currently in effect.

Chicks are hatched in broods of 2 or 3 eggs after incubation of about a month and are born naked and helpless at birth. Both parents care for the young and they will stay in their nests for about 3-months. Young Brown Pelicans can normally fly and fend for themselves after 3-months but take 3-5 years of age to reach sexual maturity.

The Brown Pelican is the state bird of Louisiana. The oldest Brown Pelican on record lived to be 43-years of age.

Everything you wanted to know about you A/C and cooling but were afraid to ask:

It's that time of year again to get ready for our summer season. And, let's face it-having a functioning A/C system is a must for the Florida summer!

For most of us, the rule of thumb is to have the central A/C system checked once a year by a qualified technician. In addition to the annual service, it's important to check on a couple of things each month during the cooling season and this should only take you a few minutes (and save you BIG in monthly power bills and in costly system replacement intervals).

Annual Air Conditioner Maintenance Checklist (Best done in the spring before it heats up!):

1. Clean the outdoor condenser coils and indoor evaporator units.

The coil is made up of the refrigerant lines and surrounding radiator-like fins of your outdoor A/C unit. The evaporator is the interior counterpart, with its own coil. Dirt and debris on the coils reduce efficiency and stress the system's mechanical parts.

2. Check the refrigerant level.

An improper amount of refrigerant makes a compressor work too hard, reducing the efficiency and longevity of the system.

3. Inspect the interior drain pans and condensate drains.

Drains must be unobstructed and clean to ensure excess moisture is not trapped in the units or inside the house. A cup of 50/50 white vinegar/warm water solution poured into the inside drain line on a monthly basis will do the trick easily and inexpensively.

4. Check outdoor fan motor and blades and indoor blower assembly.

The fan on the outside unit pulls air in through the coil fins. The indoor blower is the fan unit (motor, fan wheel and housing). Older blowers may include a drive belt that should be inspected and adjusted or replaced as needed.

5. Check compressor and refrigerant tubing.

6. Lubricate moving parts (as applicable).

Older A/C units often have ports on fan motors, compressors and other parts for adding lubrication periodically. Newer models typically have sealed parts that don't need to be lubed.

7. Inspect all electrical controls, wiring and connections.

All electrical components and hookups should be checked for soundness, wear and damage.

8. Inspect and clean or replace air filters.

9. Run a general system test.

Your technician should turn on the A/C system to check operating functions such as the starting cycle and shut-off control, check for unusual noises or odors, and measure indoor/outdoor temperatures and system pressures as needed.

10. Check ductwork for leaks and other problems.

Leakage in ductwork is one of the main causes of inefficiency in forced-air A/C and heating systems. It's a good idea to have your ductwork assessed periodically and sealed and/or insulated in problems areas, as needed and the power company may offer this free of charge!

Monthly Maintenance During the Cooling Season

First, replace the filter monthly. A standard inexpensive filter is fine with monthly replacement. And second, check the outdoor condenser and remove all leaves, grass clippings and other debris from the sides and top of the cabinet. Cut back shrubs and other vegetation as needed to maintain a minimum of 2 feet of clearance on all sides of the unit. This ensures adequate airflow to the condenser coil. With the power to the condenser off, hose down the coils in the spring and the fall, at the least, to remove sand, etc. that may inhibit air flow.

middle ground between work and play. Purple is such a blended color that it really speaks to what's going on in the world, especially for our choices of 2017 color of the year, which combines gray, blue and purple all in one tone."

Cloudberry from Olympic is a calm, soft violet that also straddles the blurred line between purple and gray.

"Blended purples evoke a lush, pampering yet calm effect that's a comforting foil to the harshness of the world right now," Schlotter says. "These trending colors are sweet without being feminine, and gray without being somber."

> The colors also mesh with the more bohemian lifestyles people seem to be pursuing, she notes. A trend toward spiritual exploration is driving interest in meditation and yoga, which blend elements of mental and physical exercise. "This fits perfectly with the purple trend because this hue is thought to represent the subconscious, and can be a meditative color in the right tone," she says.

> While Schlotter says homeowners have historically been shy about using purple, this year's hues will work well in a variety of settings. The muted nature of the colors makes them gender-neutral yet impactful, so they're great statement colors when used in a dining room, on the front door or even as an accent wall in a child's room.

> What's more, the color pairs well with trending home materials, such as gray flooring, black tiles and gold décor accents. The unique blended qualities of the colors mean these purples can adapt to the surrounding environments and blend effortlessly.

"The great thing about Violet Verbena,

Cloudberry and Byzantine Blue is that they all have hints of other colors and neutrals in them," Schlotter says. "Gray is popular now more than ever, but many consumers don't want a monochromatic look. These beautiful purple hues pull in hints of blue and gray to form chameleon-like hues that adjust based on their surroundings. They're not your typical purple, but rather can be looked at - and used - like a new neutral."
